This past year was monumental for the Wayne County Health Department. There were three major accomplishments last year. The Wayne County Health Department became a nationally accredited health department through the Public Health Accreditation Board. This achievement basically lets our community know that the Wayne County Health Department is strong and has the capacity to protect and promote the health of the community. It also confirms our commitment to quality improvement, accountability and innovation. A longer description of this achievement is below. The second accomplishment was we moved our administrative and clinical offices from its longtime location on S. Walnut St. to W. South St. in downtown Wooster. The new location is where the current Wooster American Red Cross building is located. We are appreciative of the American Red Cross for donating the building to the Wayne County Commissioners. We are also appreciative to the Wayne County Commissioners for helping renovate the building to meet our needs to better serve the community. The third major accomplishment is we developed a new strategic plan to guide the agency for the next three years. This was a result of not only staff input but also community member and stakeholder input which resulted in a work plan that centers on four major themes; Workforce Development of Staff, Improving Marketing and Communication, Modernization of the Health Department and, Continuing to be Fiscally Accountable and Sustainable. Several of our departments had some major accomplishments which are located within this report. Nationally Accredited & Recognized - What it Means

WCHD is nationally accredited through the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB). By achieving this designation, WCHD has demonstrated the highest standards for delivering quality programs and services to Wayne County residents and visitors. To receive national accreditation, WCHD participated in a peer reviewed assessment against a set of 100 quality standards and measures which covered a broad range of service areas. These included developing health assessments, investigating environmental hazards, conducting public education campaigns, engaging the community to identify issues, developing plans and policies, enforcing health laws, promoting access to health care, developing our workforce, evaluating processes and programs, and analyzing data to develop evidence-based strategies to improve population health.



Women Infant & Children (WIC)



Helping Women, Infants, and Children

The mission of WIC is to assure healthy pregnancies, healthy birth outcomes, and healthy growth and development for women, infants, and children at nutritional risk by providing nutritious supplemental foods, breastfeeding promotion and support, education on healthy eating, and referrals to healthcare. Wayne County WIC served an approximate caseload of 1177 participants and has a budget of \$407,140.00 in 2023. The Wayne County Health Department WIC program continues to serve participants by appointment only. WIC is looking forward to 2024 as we moved into a new building and will better serve our community.

2023 Updates

The WIC team has experienced many ups and downs in 2023. The infant formula industry has continued to experience some difficulties, from formula contamination to supply issues. These problems resulted in shortages of formulas for the moms who choose or needed to use formula as way to feed their babies. The Recall from the Michigan plant in 2021 and 2022 led to parents and other care givers unable to find the formulas needed to feed their babies. This is an ongoing concern with the WIC staff and the moms we serve. WIC was also able to offer an increase amount of fruit and vegetable money through the Fiscal 2023 year and part of the new Fiscal 2024. The increase in fruit and vegetable dollars to help parents and caregivers promotes a healthier way of eating.



WIC Continues to Support Breastfeeding

The WIC Breastfeeding program remains strong while continuing to support breastfeeding. WIC provides individualized support, prenatal education, and access to breast pumps to encourage and support a mother's choice whether to breastfeed. WIC's breastfeeding Peer Counselor Program provides support to mothers facing breastfeeding barriers. This year we are excited to announce a NEW Breastfeeding Peer, Lesley. Lesley will join Carli, who is an International Board Certified Lactation Counselor and the Breastfeeding Coordinator, promoting breastfeeding. Lesley and Carli, along with the rest of the WIC team, provide moms with answers to breastfeeding concerns and questions, such as returning to work after delivery, lack of workplace support for breastfeeding, as well as family and social pressures. Our breastfeeding program is here to help moms reach success with their breastfeeding goals. As always we offer support, encouragement, and care when counseling moms. Community Health Services

Communicable Disease

We welcomed a new staff member to our Communicable Disease team. Betsy Miller RN joined our team in 2023. Betsy has over 35 years of experience working in many different areas of nursing. She lives in Ashland with her husband, is a mother to 4 adult children and grandma to 2 grandbabies. Betsy assists with reviewing positive lab findings, and investigates each as necessary. Another key component to her job, is to provide education and follow-up with case patients and their medical providers to ensure appropriate treatment to prevent the spread of disease. Over 3,592 reportable cases were investigated by our communicable disease nurses this past year.

The immunization program offered by the Community Health Department is a vital service for the community to help in the control of communicable disease. The goal of the immunization program is to reduce the number of vaccine-preventable diseases through preventative immunization. In 2023 the staff administered more than 1,499 vaccines during immunization clinics held by the Wayne County Health Department, both held in-house and at outreach clinics. The range of vaccines given at the health department is broad, over 25 different immunizations are administered to both children and adults. This year in addition to the Mt. Eaton immunization clinic held on the third Thursday of every month, we are expanding services to Kidron on the second Thursday of the month, with additional back-to-school and outreach clinics being planned. We are stepping up our community outreach with a new mobile unit prepared to travel across the county. The mobile unit was paid for with grant money from the Ohio Department of Health and the mobile unit will significantly increase our ability to provide quality public health services to all corners of Wayne County. The primary focus will be on vaccinations with this unit, but we will definitely be expanding all of our services to be available on the mobile clinic.



CPR/AVERT Training

CPR/AVERT training began being offered in 2023 at the Wayne County Health Department by the Community Health Staff. Community Based CPR, Basic Life Support, AED and First Aid classes are being held here at the Health Department as needed, as well as at your place of business. AVERT (Active Violence Emergency Response Training) is being offered at local businesses on site, and is tailored training based on the needs of your facility. CPR can be a lifesaving skill when appropriately used during a medical emergency in any environment. Empowering the community to learn how to perform Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation and how to use an Automated External Defibrillator, can mean the difference between life and death.

Children with Medical Handicaps (CMH)

The Children with Medical Handicaps Program (CMH) is a health care program in the Ohio Department of Health (ODH). CMH links families of children with special health care needs to a network of quality providers and helps families obtain payment for the services their children need. This year 290 families were assisted with locating CMH service providers, completing and understanding the required forms, and ensuring the family understands the program. Being an advocate for, and educating families of their rights and responsibilities in regard to the CMH and other programs in which they may be eligible, is an extensive component of the program.



This year we participated in several local events including the 2023 Wayne County Fair, and the Wayne County Senior Forum. At the events, community members were provided with educational materials about the services of the programs offered at the Health Department. Over 1,000 sick kits, including thermometers, gloves, gowns, and alcohol pads were distributed. These kits were made possible by funds obtained through grants in the state of Ohio. We were also able to supply local nursing homes, and the sheriff's department with needed personal protective equipment to help protect the staff and residents of these facilities.

Project DAWN

Project DAWN is a network of Ohio-based drug overdose education and naloxone distribution programs. Project DAWN programs provide take-home Narcan kits to the public, free of charge. The staff at the Health Department has teamed up with area businesses, schools, restaurants, hotels and other community resources to distribute Project Dawn kits. Six hundred ninety-five (695) Project Dawn kits were distributed last year throughout the county. Wayne residents who may be in a position to reverse an overdose should carry naloxone. This is especially true for family members, friends, co-workers, neighbors and service providers in contact with people who use drugs other than marijuana.



Environmental Health Services

Did you know?

The Wayne County Health Department licenses and inspects the Tattoo & Body Piercing Establishment program which is in place to prevent injury and the possible transmission of diseases through tattoos and body piercings.

The state program rules require annual licensing and inspection of these facilities. Our inspections look at the overall sanitation of the facilities to ensure compliance with the state code requirements. The inspection criteria includes, but is not limited to, operator training in tattoo and body piercing procedures, first aid and blood borne pathogens certifications, overall sanitation of work areas and equipment, records of sterilizer tests, patron records, and various written procedures to protect the public. In 2023, WCHD performed 20 licensing inspections.



Program Spotlight: School Inspections

School buildings and associated grounds have inspections each year in accordance with the Ohio Department of Health guidelines. This is done in an effort to ensure the health & safety of the students and staff. The main focus of these inspection is for sanitary conditions. We also inspect the physical condition of the buildings, the condition and safety of the school playground equipment, various chemical and equipment storage and handling. In addition, the school cafeterias are inspected as part of our Food Protection Program. Wayne County Health Department performed 78 school inspections in 2023.



Septic Operation and Maintenance Program

All types of sewage treatment systems are required to obtain an operation permit from the local health department. The Wayne County Health Department (WCHD) is focusing on discharging septic systems in its initial phase due to their higher chance of polluting the environment and causing a public health nuisance. Approximately 2000 households and businesses are currently on the annual operational permit program. The operational program includes; inspections, tracking maintenance and service contract requirements as well as education. Business and property owners that do not demonstrate proper maintenance are inspected by the WCHD to ensure proper function. In total WCHD performed 957 operational inspections for 2023.

The Wayne County Health Department (WCHD) Environmental Health Unit (EH Unit) oversees approximately 15 programs to administer and enforce. Several of these programs are required to be surveyed for compliance by either the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency, Ohio Department of Health or Ohio Department of Agriculture.

In 2023 the WCHD EH Unit underwent survey for 5 programs with no major issues being identified. This reflects on the level of competent service we provide to our residents in administering the program correctly.

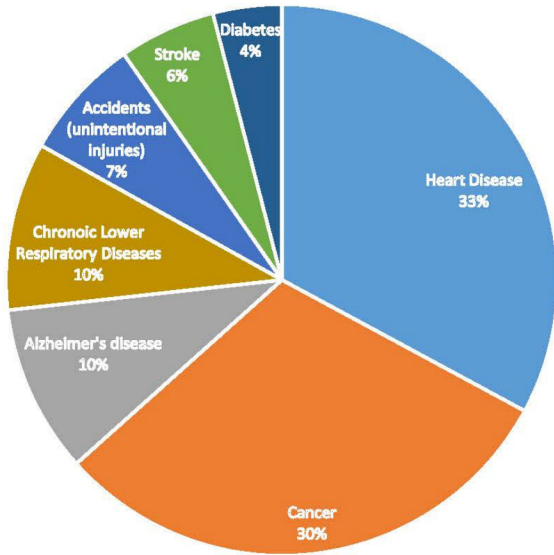

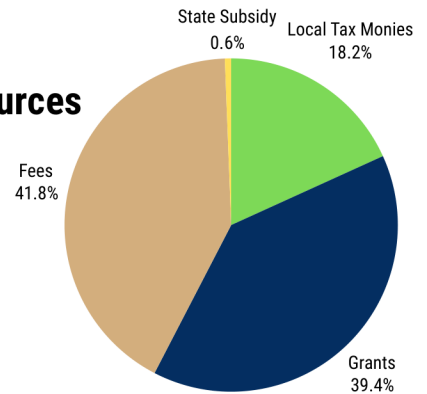

PHEP - Public Health Emergency Preparedness

The Wayne County Health Department's Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) program, now in its 21st year, is funded by a CDC grant through the Ohio Department of Health. Liz, the current Emergency Response (ERC) and PHEP coordinator, joined the department in late summer of 2023. Her role involves preparing for, mitigating, responding to, and aiding in the recovery from public health threats and emergencies. The program aims to bolster the department's capacity to handle events like bioterrorism and infectious disease outbreaks. In the fall of 2023, Liz continued the emergency preparedness efforts of her predecessor, overseeing activities such as State-wide Full-scale exercise in collaboration with partner organizations like the Red Cross, local hospitals and law enforcement agencies.
